Who Will Be Instructing?

The Camp will have the highest level of amateur umpires teaching the mechanics and on field situation control recommended by the NCAA and TASO. The experience level of the instructors represent years of D-1, NCAA Regional, College World Series and professional baseball experience. The instruction will be timely and will address each situation as it occurs. You will get their situational knowledge on the spot and won't have to wait till the end of the game.

What Do I Need For The Camp?

1 - Bring umpire equipment for both plate work and base work. Because the Texas weather can be unpredictable, an umpire jacket is recommended for both plate and base work. Warm up suits and sweats will be acceptable for the classroom session. Look professional and present a professional image.

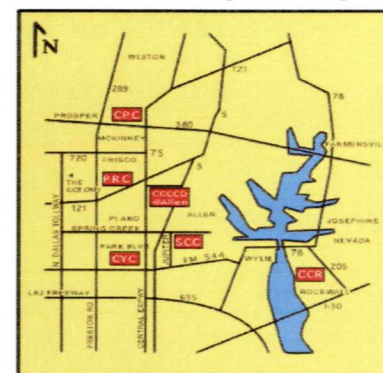
